

Mangal Singh, culminated in the establishment of the iconic Sikh National College at the historic Sikh shrine of Buddha Ka Awa in Lahore. Tiding over the vicissitudes of the Partition of Punjab, progressive Sikh leaders re-established the Sikh National College in 1948 at Qadian, Punjab, in the area vacated by the Ahmediyas. Today, the Sikh Educational Society continues to play a vital role in providing inclusive education through its regional institutions. 
Infrastructure and Resources

Baba Banda Singh Bahadur Boys' Hostel

The on-campus Boys' Hostel offers AC and Non-AC rooms, accommodating around 300 students. It includes a Warden's office, waiting room, mess, study room, fitness centre, indoor games area, guest room and an LCD TV hall. Each room is furnished with a bed (excluding bedding), study table, chair and cupboard. The hostel is equipped with washing machines, water purifiers, coolers, geysers, Wi-Fi and a generator. Fire extinguishers and water pipes are installed for safety. CCTV cameras are strategically placed for security.

Mata Khevi Girls' Hostel







Best Practice: Environmental Sustainability



Environmental sustainability is a core focus of the UN Sustainable Development Goals, as well as the G20, Y20, B20 Agendas and India's National Education Policy 2020. In alignment with these objectives, SGGSC, Chandigarh, promotes a comprehensive Best Practice of Environmental Sustainability by integrating both traditional wisdom and modern science to conserve natural resources and protect ecosystems.

Key Initiatives:

Guru Nanak Sacred Forest – A Mini Urban Forest: Established in 2019, this forest is a unique, community-led biodiversity conservation effort comprising 600 trees and 52 native species over 180 square meters. It symbolises the preservation of genetic heritage and is actively maintained by students, faculty and other stakeholders.

Observation and Research Centre: Located within the forest, this centre enables interdisciplinary research on native species, supported by the Department of Science and Technology and the Department of Environment, Chandigarh Administration. Over 50 research papers have been published across disciplines such as Literature, History, Religious Studies, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Biotechnology.

Balihari Kudrat Healing and Sacred Herbs Garden: This garden promotes the scientific and spiritual understanding of medicinal plants, emphasising the link between ecological healing, biodiversity and cultural traditions.

Air Quality Index (AQI) Installation: The AQI system within the forest reflects the College's dedication to monitor and maintain environmental health.

BAAZ Bird Watchers' Society: A student-driven initiative for bird observation and documentation. Data is collected and organised digitally. The College participated in the 2024 Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) and Bird-a-Thon organised by Cornell University and the Audubon Society, identifying 101 birds from 14 species.

PAWS Humane Society for Animal Assisted Therapy: A pioneering initiative to foster empathy and animal welfare among students. The society has adopted 10 stray dogs and promotes dignity in human-animal relationships.

Barah Maha Garden of Biodiversity: A pilot project planting flowering species that attract birds, butterflies and bees, contributing to pollination and ecological diversity.

Eco Fiesta 2025, a three-day flagship event themed 'Sustainability in Action: Aiming to Achieve Life Mission Goals,' showcased the College's vibrant sustainability ethos. Sponsored by the Punjab State Council for Science and Technology, along with the support of the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, the event featured workshops on sustained, innovative and low-impact living solutions.

Best Practice: Environmental Sustainability

The key components included Eco-Friendly Stalls by SGGSC Self-Help Groups, an E-Waste Collection Drive by Ecoscouts and a Mental Health Help Desk underscoring emotional well-being as part of sustainable living.

Environmental Awareness Campaigns and Collaborations: Regular events, workshops and nature trails are conducted in partnership with:

- Punjab Biodiversity Board (PBB)
- ENVIS Centre
- Department of Environment
- PSCST
- CREST
- Forest & Wildlife Preservation Department
- Department of Soil & Water Conservation
- Central Ground Water Board
- Punjab State Rural Development Board

The College also collaborates with other academic institutions and has adopted five villages—Chaumajra, Durali, Gobindgarh, Manauli and Tasoli—for impactful outreach programs.

Student Entrepreneurship and Self-Help Ventures: Students promote sustainable living by setting up stalls featuring:

- Bio-organic manure from botanical waste
- Millet-based meals
- Eco-friendly pens and pencils
- Water and Solar Energy Conservation
- Three rainwater harvesting systems are installed on campus
- Rooftop solar power plants with a capacity exceeding 270 kW provide sustainable energy solutions



Eco-friendly Campus Practices:

- **Zero Litter Hour:** Observed daily by students and faculty
- **5Rs Policy:** Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repurpose, Recycle
- **Zero Food Wastage:** Implemented in hostels, cafeterias and events, to minimise food waste and promote responsible consumption
- **Waste Management:** Colour-coded bins for wet and dry waste and separate bins for plastic waste
- **Vermicomposting for leaf litter**
- **Milk Bag Recycling Initiative:** A focused effort by the College, to reduce plastic waste by collecting and recycling used milk bags

Floral Recycling Initiative: Flowers used during College events are collected and sent to the Saraswati Women's Self-Help Group to be repurposed into incense sticks and candles.

Held at the Sardar Hari Singh Nalwa Multipurpose Hall, it showcased traditional weaponry from the Misl period, celebrating the martial and spiritual legacy of the Khalsa.

Other initiatives include:

Skill and Vocational Training: In collaboration with Mehar Baba Charitable Trust, women are trained in Phulkari and other traditional arts such as Cross-stitch, Pakhi-making, Bagh, Peerhi-making and Crochet. Students also learn Gurmukhi Calligraphy, Gurmat Studies, Rabab, Sarangi, Jorhi, Tabla, Shabad Gayan and Gatka. Free Gurmat Sangeet classes are offered.

Partnership with Panjab Digital Library: The College supports the *Adopt-a-Book* initiative, curates heritage exhibitions and has developed Heritage Walls on campus to raise awareness of Punjab's literary and historical heritage.

Preservation of the Punjabi Maa Boli: Buildings and societies are named using culturally significant Punjabi terms. Regular events sustain and celebrate linguistic and cultural heritage.

Pioneering Research: The College encourages the publication of scholarly books, research papers and doctoral theses focusing on cultural preservation and oral traditions.

SGGS Resource Centre for Heritage and Cultural Preservation: Offers immersive workshops and training sessions that encourage exploration of cultural identity.



As part of its commitment to inclusive education, the College granted full admission fee waivers and free hostel accommodation to 16 visually impaired students for the academic session 2024–25.



Environment Awareness

Waste Management Committee

In alignment with the *Swachh Bharat Mission*, the College is committed to foster a zero-waste campus and promote sustainable environmental practices. Through consistent efforts, the institution advocates the principles of the 5Rs: **Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repurpose and Recycle**. Key initiatives undertaken include:

Source-based Waste Segregation: All campus waste is segregated at source and either recycled or sold to authorised vendors.

Zero Litter Hour: A designated hour is observed regularly to instil cleanliness habits among students.

Zero Food Wastage Campaign: Aims to reduce food waste and encourage mindful consumption in hostels, cafeterias and during college events.

Colour-coded Dustbins: Strategically placed across campus to separate wet and dry waste effectively.

Wet Waste Collection: Organic waste from the mess and cafeteria is collected daily by local pig farmers, ensuring zero landfill contribution.

Composting Practices: Leaf litter is composted through simple, bacterial and vermicomposting pits to support organic gardening and sustainable horticulture.

Floral Waste Recycling: Decorative flowers used during College functions are sent to the Sarwati Women's Self-Help Group, where they are repurposed into incense sticks and candles.

Plastic Use Regulation: Single-use plastic and plastic bags are strictly restricted on campus.

Plastic Bottle Disposal: Dedicated bins for plastic bottles help manage and reduce plastic pollution.

Liquid Waste Management: The College is connected to the Municipal Corporation's drainage system. Wastewater from air conditioners is repurposed for garden irrigation.

Biomedical Waste Disposal: Waste from the Bacterial Culture Lab is autoclaved before disposal, ensuring safe and contamination-free handling.

E-waste Management: An e-waste store and collection box are maintained for responsible disposal through authorised vendors. Printer cartridges are routinely refilled and reused.

Paperless Administration: Office automation has significantly reduced paper usage. Internal communications related to admissions, examinations, fees and records are now managed digitally via emails and messages.

Horticulture Bioreactor: A bioreactor has been installed in the Botanical Garden to manage garden waste efficiently.

Milk Bag Recycling: A dedicated bin has been installed in the area behind the canteen to minimise the deleterious impact of empty milk packets.

Student-led Sustainability Initiatives: Self-help groups and College entrepreneurial ventures frequently set up stalls featuring bio-organic manure (produced from campus compost), eco-friendly stationery and more, actively promoting sustainable living.

Supported by the Ministry of Education (MHRD), this initiative equips students with practical skills that enhance employability. Many have benefited from these courses, adding valuable credentials to their academic journey.

Parent Teacher Association

The Parent-Teacher Association provides a structured platform for collaboration between faculty and parents or guardians, aiming to enrich students' academic and personal development.

Mentor/Mentee Programme

The Mentor–Mentee Programme fosters a supportive academic environment through sustained faculty–student interaction. It promotes collaborative learning, career guidance and personal counselling, ensuring comprehensive development. By encouraging open dialogue and trust, the programme strengthens student engagement and reflects the College's commitment to student-centric education.

Regular meetings are held each semester to share updates on student progress. Additionally, structured feedback from parents and students plays a key role in enhancing teaching strategies and improving the overall learning experience.

Holistic Development

National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF)

Aligned with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and approved by the UGC, the NSQF initiative at the College promotes lifelong learning and skill development. Under this framework, the College offers a Diploma in Journalism and Mass Communication (DJMC) with an intake of 25 students. The programme integrates theory with practice through capacity-building workshops, training sessions and field visits to media houses like Rozana Spokesman, Naya Lok Yuga and NZ Punjabi. These experiences significantly enhance students' industry readiness.

NET Classes

To support postgraduates preparing for the NTA-UGC NET and CSIR-UGC NET exams, the College offers regular coaching sessions. These classes focus on familiarising students with exam patterns and sharpening their problem-solving and analytical skills.

Remedial Classes

Remedial Classes are conducted to bridge learning gaps and support students needing academic reinforcement. These sessions encourage inclusive learning and help every student work toward their academic potential.

ICT Cell

The College is a recognised Local Chapter of NPTEL-SWAYAM, a national online education initiative by IIT Madras and MHRD. Through this platform, students can access free certification courses across Engineering, Science and Humanities disciplines, supporting self-paced, technology-driven learning.

Student Council

The College has an annually elected Student Council comprising the President, Vice President, General Secretary and Joint Secretary. Working under the guidance of the Dean Student Welfare, the Council fosters democratic participation and leads various cultural, literary, sports and community initiatives.

Foreign Students Welfare

The Office of the Dean of Foreign Students ensures the integration and support of international students on campus. To nurture inclusivity, the College organises cultural exchanges that enrich the learning environment. In the session 2024–25, four students from Afghanistan were enrolled across UG and PG programmes—two sponsored by the (Indian Council of Cultural Relations) ICCR and two on a self-finance basis.



Alumni Association

Alumni Association of the College fosters strong ties between former students and their alma mater. Alumni from diverse fields—civil services, armed forces, sports, medicine, education, politics, social work and business—actively contribute to the College's growth. Their accomplishments are honoured on the Alumni Wall of Fame, inspiring current students.







National Education Policy (NEP-2020)

Curriculum and Credit Framework for UG Programmes under NEP, Panjab University, Chandigarh

In accordance with the NEP 2020, UGC has formulated a New Student-Centric 'Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (CCFUP)' incorporating

- **Flexible Choice-Based Credit System**
- **Multidisciplinary Approach**
- **Multiple Entry and Exit Options**

This will facilitate students to pursue their career path by choosing the subject / field of their interest. The duration of UG Degree (Honours) shall be of 4 years (eight semesters). A student can exit at the end of 3 years (six semesters) and shall be awarded UG Degree. A student can also exit at the end of 2 years (four semesters) shall be awarded UG Diploma. A student can also exit at the end of 1 year (two semesters) and shall be awarded UG Certificate. For obtaining UG Certificate/UG Diploma/UG Degree/ UG Degree (Honours)/ UG Degree (Honours with Research), a student shall qualify the number of credits as per these Regulations and Scheme framed in accordance with these Regulations.

UG Certificate: The student who opts to exit after completion of the first year and has secured minimum **48 credits** shall be awarded a UG certificate provided she/he secures 6 credits from the skill based courses earned during the 1st and 2nd semesters (included in **48 credits**) and completes summer internship/vocational/apprenticeship course of 4 credits during the summer vacations of the first year. The student shall be allowed to resume within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

UG Diploma: The student who opts to exit after completion of the second year and has secured minimum **96 credits** shall be awarded the UG diploma provided she/he secures 4 credits from internship/vocational course during the summer vacations of the second year. The student shall be allowed to resume within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

3-year UG Degree: The student opting to undergo a 3-year UG programme shall be awarded a UG Degree in the major discipline after a successful completion of 3 years, securing minimum **144 credits** including the minimum credit requirements for ability enhancement courses, skill development courses, value added courses, and community engagement/internship/field based project(s).

4-year UG Degree (Honours): A four-year UG Honours degree in the major discipline shall be awarded to those students who complete a 4-year UG programme successfully with minimum **192 credits** including minimum credit requirements for ability enhancement courses, skill development courses, value added courses, and community engagement/internship/field based project(s).

4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research): The students securing 75% marks and above, in the first six semesters of UG programme shall be allowed to choose a research stream at the undergraduate level in the 4th year. She/he shall complete a research project or dissertation in the major discipline under the guidance of an approved faculty member of the University/College. The student securing minimum **192 credits**, including **12 credits** from a research project/dissertation fulfilling minimum credit requirements for ability enhancement courses, skill development courses, value added courses, and community engagement/internship/field-based project(s).

National Education Policy (NEP-2020)

Components of Curriculum Framework of Undergraduate Programme

In the inaugural year of the undergraduate programme, students will have the opportunity to create a multidisciplinary academic plan. This will include the following components:

Course Type	Description
Major Core (DSC)	The major or Discipline Specific Core (DSC) would provide the opportunity to the student in pursuing in-depth study of a particular subject or discipline.
Minor Stream (DSC)	It is an additional area of study selected by the students, typically outside their major discipline.
Multidisciplinary/ Interdisciplinary Course (MDC)	These courses are designed to broaden the intellectual experience and is other than their major and minor stream. Students are not allowed to choose or repeat courses already undergone at the higher secondary level (12 th class).
Ability Enhancement Course (AEC)	These courses aim to enhance the knowledge of students in Modern Indian Language (MIL) and English Language with special emphasis on language and communication skills.
Skill Enhancement Course (SEC)	These courses aim at imparting practical skills, hands-on training and soft skills for enhancing the employability of students.
Value Added Course (VAC)	These courses provide practical, real-world skills and knowledge, complementing theoretical foundations and preparing students for future careers. Value added courses stated under NEP for UG programmes should relate to Understanding India; Environmental Science/ Education; Digital and Technological Solutions; and Health & Wellness, Yoga Education, Sports, and Fitness.
Compulsory Punjabi/ HCP	Students who have studied Punjabi upto 10 th Level will opt for Punjabi and students who have not studied Punjabi in 10 th Level will opt for HCP.
Summer Internship/ Apprenticeship/ Community Engagement and Services / Field-based Learning / Minor Projects (2 Credits; 30 Contact hours)	Summer Internship/ Apprenticeship/ Community Engagement and Services / Field-based Learning / Minor Projects have been incorporated in curriculum so that students can gain insight into actual life experiences and are able to generate solutions to real-life problems.
Research Project/ Dissertation (4 Credits; 60 Contact hours)	Students opting for 4- year UG Degree (Honours with Research) are required to take up research projects under the guidance of a faculty member. They will be required to complete the Research Project in the 8th Semester. The research outcomes of their project may be published in peer- reviewed journals or may be presented in conferences/ seminars or may be patented.

National Education Policy (NEP-2020)

Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary UG Programme

Under the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach is promoted to foster a holistic and integrated learning experience. A multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach involves drawing upon knowledge and perspectives from multiple disciplines to understand a problem by integrating these different disciplines into a unified framework. In this light, the College offers multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary UG programmes. For students pursuing a multidisciplinary UG programme, the credits to core courses will be distributed among the broad disciplines such as Life sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical and Computer Sciences, Data Analysis, Social Sciences, Humanities, etc., For example, a student who opts for a UG programme in Life sciences will have the total credits to core courses distributed across Botany, Zoology and Human biology disciplines. The degree will be awarded as BSc in Life Sciences for a 3-year programme and BS. (Honours) in Life Sciences or BSc (Honours with Research) for a 4-year programme without or with a research component respectively.

1. Admission to all classes will be made strictly as per eligibility and merit criteria laid down by PU depending on the available seats.
2. For admission, fraction of marks less than the requisite percentage would not be rounded off to the advantage of the candidates, i.e. 32.9%, 39.9% and 49.9% shall not be rounded off to 33%, 40% and 50% etc. respectively.
3. Candidates having passed +2 exam without English from any recognised body are eligible to join BA/BSc/BCA/BCom/BBA, otherwise, he/she has to pass the deficient English Subject with parent Board/University in two consecutive chances; failing which admission will automatically stand cancelled.
4. All Compartment Candidates must fulfil requirements as per regulations under rules and regulations governing admissions.

(b) +2 Examination with at least two of the subjects mentioned in (a) securing at least 50% marks in aggregate;

(c) +2 Examination who does not covered in (a) and (b) securing at least 55% marks.

(d) Any other examination recognised by the University as equivalent to (a) or (b) or (c) as given above with requisite percentage of marks given under each clause.

Subject to the reservation made by the University, the admission shall be on merit. The merit for this purpose shall be determined on the basis of the score of a candidate to be computed as follows:

(i) Percentage of marks in the qualifying examination;

(ii) Add score of 2 for each of the subjects passed from the subjects referred in 2.1 (a) not exceeding a score of 8 in total.

Explanation: In case of a compartment candidate, eligibility shall be determined by including the marks of the subject in which the candidate has been placed in Compartment

Rules and Regulations Governing Admissions

1. The candidates shall be admitted strictly in accordance with the rules and regulations contained in the latest Panjab University Calendar/Guidelines/any other instructions which have been issued/may be issued by the University from time to time for the respective courses/examinations and in order of merit.
2. All the admissions to these institutions are provisional and subject to the approval of Panjab University. The institution cannot be held responsible in case the University does not approve the admission of a student on account of giving incomplete information, concealing necessary facts or false information, attaching incomplete testimonials or choosing wrong combination of subjects or delayed submission of certificates etc. The fine/penalty imposed by Panjab University for any default in this regard shall be the personal responsibility of the student. Claims for refund of fees for cancellation of admission or penalty on this account will not be entertained.
3. All provisionally admitted candidates will have to verify original documents before the Admission Committee as and when required by the College/University Authorities.
4. Any instructions or rules received from the Director Higher Education, Chandigarh Administration/Panjab University, after the publication of this prospectus, will be binding on the students.
5. Students disqualified by any University/Board shall not be admitted.

Candidates from Open School

Students who have passed 10+2 examination from Open School recognised by Panjab University are eligible for admission to the BA/BSc/BCA/BCom/BBA 1st year and they should have obtained the requisite percentage of marks for the course.

Foreign Students

All Foreign/NRI Students shall obtain Eligibility Certificate from Deputy Registrar (General), Panjab University in all cases and the admission of the Foreign/NRI students to College would be governed by the Guidelines issued by the Dean, International Students, PU. After obtaining the Eligibility Certificate, the candidate should submit the same, in original, to College. The eligibility form should be accompanied by a forwarding letter from the Principal of the College indicating the reason for denying the admission to the candidate.

Checklist of Documents for Foreign Students

- a. Original Passport / Visa. (Wherever applicable)
 - b. Valid Student Visa for all Foreign Students and Resident permit for Tibetan Students
 - c. A certificate of registration from the local police after taking the admission in the College
 - d. Date of Birth Certificate with Father's/Mother's name
 - e. An eligibility certificate from the Deputy Registrar (Gen) Panjab University to desired course
 - f. Academic certificates and testimonials
 - g. Original Letter/s of Scholarship/s in case of those who are Government of India sponsored Scholars
- The College has the right to reject any admission form and refuse admission if there is any discrepancy in the name, date of birth or even spellings of the names in passport, certificates, testimonials and birth certificate etc. of the students.
 - Foreign diplomats will be permitted to pursue studies only after undergoing a change in their visa status, i.e., from diplomat visa to student visa.

Rules and Regulations Governing Admissions

Compartment Candidates

- a. A candidate who has been placed under compartment in the +2 examination conducted by a Board/Body/Council/University in India shall be eligible to seek admission to the First Semester of UG Programmes—BA/BSc/BCom/BBA/BCA (except BSc Biotech Hons) provided he fulfils the following conditions:
 - i. He/She should have been placed in compartment in one subject only;
 - ii. He/She should have obtained at least 20% marks in the subject in which he had been placed in compartment; and
 - iii. He/She should have obtained the requisite percentage of marks in aggregate of the examination (subjects) as laid down in the relevant regulations.

Provided that:-

A candidate joining the BSc//BA First Semester should have obtained at least 35% marks /50% in case of BCA/BBA/45% in BCom marks in the aggregate of all the subjects (including the marks obtained by him in the subject of compartment, Theory & Practical/s taken together) taken up by him/her at the +2 examination.

The admission of the candidate with a compartment as indicated above shall be provisional and will be confirmed only after the candidate has cleared the compartment in one consecutive chance subsequent to the admission. In case the candidate does not clear the compartment at any of the one consecutive chance allowed to candidate subsequent to the date of the admission, the provisional admission of the candidate to the course shall stand cancelled.

Note: The candidates securing less than 20% marks in the subject of compartment at the +2 examination be made eligible to join UG courses 1st Semester, if they cleared their compartment subject/s in the Supplementary Examination held in July/August, on or before the last date for admission with late fee with the permission of the Vice Chancellor, provided the seat/s is/are available.

Such candidates are required to submit the following documents to the office immediately after the declaration of result:

- Original DMC with compartment result
 - Original DMC with PASS result.
- b. Compartment Candidates of +2 Examination seeking admission to first degree level running parallel utility-oriented certificate/Diploma/Advances Diploma and Add-on Courses Programme along with BA/BSc/BCom/BCA/BBA Part-I Course.

With a view to vocationalise the education at first-degree level during Xth plan period, parallel utility-oriented certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma Programs have been introduced. The candidates who are placed in compartment in +2 examination having been admitted provisionally to BA/BSc/BCom Part-I Class shall also be considered to have been admitted provisionally in these courses. The eligibility requirements and Regulations/Rules for certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma Courses sanctioned by the UGC under Career Orientation Programme to various affiliated Colleges from the admissions of 2004 as Add-On Courses for BA/BSc/BCom (Semester System) (1st, 2nd and 3rd) will be same as for admission to BA/BSc/BCom Course (Semester System).
 - c. A student of any other university who is placed under compartment in BA/BSc/ BCA/BCom/BBA Course (I/II/III) is not allowed to join the BA/BSc/ BCom/BBA Course (II/III) or PG Courses of this university.

Rules and Regulations Governing Admissions

- d. A candidate who is placed under Compartment in one subject in BA III exam of this University shall be allowed to join MA (Semester System) class provisionally if he/she fulfils other requirements and provided -
- the subject in which he/ she has to re appear is not offered for the MA I year exam.
 - if he/ she fails to clear the Compartment subject of the BA III year exam in the next two consecutive chances immediately following the exam in which he/ she was placed under Compartment, his/her provisional admission to MA I class as also his/ her result of MA I Year (1st and 2nd Semesters) exam shall be cancelled. (Addition of Regulation 12 appearing at page 93 for MA/ MSc exam (Semester System) (Revised) of PU Calendar, Volume II 2007)

Private Candidates

Besides fulfilling eligibility conditions, private candidates are also required to submit an affidavit of good conduct or character certificate from a gazetted officer.

Not Eligible to Join Next Higher Class Even Provisionally

- Candidates who have passed examination from University/ Board, equivalence of which has not been approved by the PU Chandigarh. (Please see equivalence booklet 1999, consolidated supplementary list 2004, list of Fake Universities and List of Non-recognised Boards).
- Candidates of any other University whose results have been declared as 'Result Late'.
- Candidates who have been disqualified by any Board/University.
- Candidates placed in compartment/re-appear in more than one subject in 10+2 examinations.
- For Ongoing classes, promotion from second to third or from fourth to fifth semester, the candidate with less than 50% of the total credits cleared/passed till that semester.
- Compartment Candidates of other Universities.
- Candidates who could not acquire 20% marks in the compartment subject in 10+2.

Migration of Candidates

- Students from other colleges affiliated to PU may be allowed to migrate (transfer) with the prior permission of the concerned Principals and as per the University rules and regulations. The candidate has to submit a College Leaving Certificate from the previous college along with the other certificates.
- Migration Certificate is not required from students of School Boards of Punjab, Haryana, HP and CBSE, Delhi.
- The candidates coming from other Universities/ Boards/ Councils/ Bodies are required to provide:
 - A migration certificate in original from the Board/University concerned.
 - The lower examination pass certificate, in original.
 - Lecture statement from the College he/she migrates if required.

Admission shall not be granted without submission of the Migration Certificate in original latest by September 10, 2024 or as specified by PU from time to time. Thereafter the requisite document shall be accepted with penalty as per PU Admission Guideline 2024-25

- d. A candidate who has passed his/her 1st Semester and 2nd Semester of BA/BSc (General)/BCom./BBA/BCA Course conducted by another University/College affiliated to another university in India under specific authorization by the University concerned, be allowed to migrate to a college affiliated to this University/ Department of Evening Studies/University School of Open Learning in the 3rd semester/5th semester of

the respective course (as per rules prescribed under Chapter XIV –‘Migration of Students’ Page No.292 to 309 of P.U. Calendar Volume-III, 2019) on the condition that such a candidate will have to clear the deficient subject(s) if any, within the permissible chances.

Deficiencies should be determined by the Principal/Chairperson at the time of admission under intimation to the University (i.e. on the Registration Return and examination forms) as well as to the students as per University Rule No.6 given at Page No.310-311 of P.U. Calendar Volume – III, 2019.

- e. Migration fee and eligibility fee shall be charged from every student coming from another University.
- f. No migration shall be allowed in a Postgraduate Course from a college affiliated to another University during second year.
- g. Migration of students from professional college to an Arts/Science college and vice versa is not permissible.
- h. When the migration of the student has been allowed, he must join the new college within 15 days otherwise the migration shall automatically stand cancelled.

Note: The migration shall be allowed only if the applicants are eligible for admission to the course as per PU admission regulations.

Late Admission

- a. Permission of the Vice-Chancellor, Panjab University is necessary for admission after the expiry of the last date for admission given with the Principal’s permission.
- b. A student whose result of +2 examination in February/March conducted by a School Board is published late in the year of admission he/she may be admitted without late fee within 15 working days of the declaration of the result and his/her attendance shall be counted from the date of admission. This would be applicable to an Open School Board also. (See Rule 10 at Page No. 363 of P.U. Calendar Volume-III, 2019).
- c. In the case of Panjab University students who have already appeared in any of its examination and the result is declared late for one or the other reason, the admission cannot be said to be a case of fresh admission. They are already midway of the class. In these cases, admissions to the next class/course may be allowed within 10 working days, from the date of dispatch of result, without charging any late fee.

Cancellation of Admission and Readmission

Admission of all such candidates who fail to attend at least 33% of the total lectures delivered and practical held in all papers during the first 10 days (from start of teaching work) in the concerned course without sanctioned leave will be cancelled as per following:

- a. List of candidates whose admission is cancelled will be put on notice board.
- b. The candidates have to give in writing the reason for non-attendance.
- c. If a student’s name is struck off from the college rolls, he/she will be required to seek readmission within 10 working days failing which his/her admission will stand cancelled.
- d. Re-admission will be done subject of availability of seats and fee of Rs 1,500/- will be charged
- e. Re-admission is not the right of every student. It is the prerogative of the Principal of the College.
- f. The attendance of the student seeking re-admission will however be counted from the first day of teaching and not from the date of re-admission.
- g. It is mandatory for the student to bring his/her parents at the time of re-admission.
- h. All vacated seats will be filled from the waiting list.

Rules and Regulations Governing Admissions

Rules for Withdrawal

- a. Students leaving the College must inform the Principal in writing on prescribed WITHDRAWAL FORM (available online). He/ She must submit withdrawal form along with a copy of fee slip duly signed by him/her and his/her parents/authorised guardian and counter signed by the respective Admission Convenor. Until a student's name is formally withdrawn, he is liable to pay all College dues and fines levied.
- b. No certificate/no refund of fees is permissible to those leaving the College without permission.
- c. No Certificate of any kind shall be issued to students unless the arrears of fine, Hostel or College dues or fine of library books are cleared.

Refund of Fees

- a. Refund of Fees will be processed as per UGC/ PU Guidelines/DHE Chandigarh norms.
- b. Refund form will be available online in login portal student.sggscollege.ac.in

Deficient Subjects

Deficient subject is one which is not passed by the candidate in the previous institution in that class and is required to be qualified for admission to the next higher class.

- a. A Candidate seeking admission to the College after migration from Universities other than the Panjab University shall clear deficient subjects, if any.
- b. Deficiencies shall be determined by the Principal/ Chairperson at the time of admission under intimation to University (i.e. on the registration Return and examination forms) as well as to the students as per University rule No 6 given at Page 310-II of PU Calendar, Vol III, 2019.
- c. The candidate should be asked to furnish the details of the courses he/she has covered in his/her previous institution, i.e., course contents etc. And that should be certified by the Principal/ Competent Authority of the previous institution.
- d. In case of students who have passed their BA/BSc/Bom/BCA/BBA part I/II examination from Universities other than those from the Punjab State there should be no deficient subjects.
- e. In case the student had covered more than 50% of the syllabus prescribed by the PU in a subject it shall not be treated to be a deficient subject.

Provision for Non-Affiliated Subject

Regular Candidates of BA/BSc/BCom/BCA/BBA of affiliated colleges may be allowed to pursue a subject of interest respectively for BA/BSc/BCom/BBA (Pass/ Honours) Courses, in which his/her college is not affiliated, by attending the prescribed course of instruction in that subject in another college affiliated for it, in accordance with the provisions of Regulation 25 appearing at page 54 of Panjab University Calendar Vol II, 2000 (previously page 55 of Panjab University Calendar Vol II, 1955) by paying the requisite fee at other College with prior permission of the Principal.

Reservation of Seats & Weightage

Reservation of seats in different categories will be made as per instructions issued by PU /UT Administration from time to time. Supernumerary Seats are additional Seats over and above the approved Seats per Unit of the courses as per regulations and are not de-reserved in any case. Students can apply for more than one reserve category, but can get benefits in only one category of his/her choice. The reservation of seats shall be governed

- A) The reservation of seats for Students belonging to **Scheduled Castes/ Tribes** shall be governed by the Regulation 29.1 and 29.2 given at page 168 in Panjab University Calendar Volume-I, 2005 and intimation/s received from DPI (Colleges):

Students of SC/ST and BC shall be allowed a concession of 5% marks for admission to the courses in which a certain percentage of minimum marks has been prescribed provided they have obtained minimum pass marks as prescribed by regulations. (PU Calendar Vol. I, Page 168, Regulation 29.1 (IT))

- B) Reservations for the **Physically Challenged** 5% marks concession shall be given to Physically handicapped persons in the minimum eligibility criteria for a course subject to minimum permanent disability of 40% provided they have obtained minimum pass marks. Students with a temporary disability will not be considered against the reserved seats for the physically challenged. Where the certificate is issued by any authority other than the Principal Medical Officer of Chandigarh, the concerned Head of the institution shall refer the candidate to the Principal Medical Officer, Chandigarh and shall admit the candidate only after confirmation from the PMO, Chandigarh.

- C) Wards of **Freedom Fighters** as per University rules:

2% seats in each pool will be filled from the category of children and grandchildren of Freedom Fighters. A certificate issued by the Deputy Commissioner of the concerned district will have to be attached with the admission form

- D) Reservation of **Dependents of Defence/ Paramilitary Personnel** etc will be followed as per Panjab University letter no 7751-7780/ Misc/ A-6 dated Aug 14, 2003 and the circular issued by the GOI, Ministry of Home Affairs, no 27011/9/98-PF-I dated May 26, 1998.

- E) Reservation for **Sports**: 2% Seats in each course are reserved for Sports Persons.

Guidelines for admission to this category will be as per rules and regulations of Sports Department of the Chandigarh Administration vide Home Secretary letter no. 8493 dated May 5, 2003.

Foreign Nationals/NRI Candidates: 10% over and above the total number of regular seats in each course is reserved for Foreign Nationals/ NRI candidates.

- F) Wards of **Kashmiri Migrants and Kashmiri Pandits/Kashmiri Hindu Families** (Non- Migrants living in Kashmiri Valley)
- Relaxation in cut-off percentage upto 10% subject to minimum eligibility requirements.
 - Increase in intake capacity upto 5% course-wise.
 - Reservation of at least one seat in merit quota in technical/professional institutions.
 - Waiving off domicile requirements. As per Circular No.Misc./A-1/1327-1627 dated 20.02.2024 (Already circulated by the Colleges Branch).

The benefit of additional seats under the aforesaid categories will not be admissible to the students seeking admission in the courses falling under regulatory agencies such as MCI, DCI, BCI and NCTE.

G) Wards of Martyrs/Permanent Disabled of Kargil War :

Concession be given for admission to various courses in Educational Institutions for those wards of martyrs/ permanent disabled (up to 80% leading to incapacitation) of Kargil war who have a valid certificate from the Ministry of Defence to this effect and the same be entered in the Pension Book of the family:

- 1% seats with minimum of 1 seat in the Departments and affiliated Colleges; (except in partially financed/ self-financing courses.)
- Exemption in fee
- Exemption in hostel fee. As per Circular No.Misc./A-1/1327-1627 dated 20.02.2024 (Already circulated by the Colleges Branch).

H) Additional seats for **One Girl Child** out of only Two Girl Children and patients of Cancer/AIDS/Thalassemia.

- Two additional seats, per unit, per course, for a Single Girl Child or One Girl Child out of only Two Girl Children, subject to maximum limit of four.
- One additional seat each for the student suffers from **Cancer/AIDS/Thalassemia**:

As per Circular No.Misc./A-1/1327-1627 dated 20.02.2024 (Already circulated by the Colleges Branch).

I) **Orphan Children** (Approved by Hon'ble Vice Chancellor as per authority given by the Senate vide Para 1 meeting dated 10.02.2024 to exercise power of Syndicate)

- Two supernumerary seats (one male and one female) created for orphan children in every Academic Program at UG/PG level.
- The Student seeking admission shall have to submit/upload certificate from a Govt. recognized Orphanage/ Charitable Home or Death Certificate of both the Parents.

J) Additional seats for **Border area and Rural area** students

- Two seats for the candidates belonging to rural areas should have passed the 10th and 12th class examination from the rural area to become eligible for additional seats meant for rural area students.
- One seat for the candidates belonging to border areas should have passed the 10th class examination from a school situated in border area and the 12th from a school situated in any other area to become eligible for additional seats meant for border area student. As per Circular No.Misc./A-1/1327-1627 dated 20.02.2024(Already circulated by the Colleges Branch).

K) One Additional seat for **Transgender Students**

One additional seat be created for the transgender students from the session 2024-25 onwards in each course in the Panjab University Teaching Departments, Panjab University Regional Centres, Panjab University Constituent Colleges and the Colleges affiliated to the University, subject to the following eligibility conditions, provided the concerned Regulatory Body Permits.

- a. The candidate seeking admission is otherwise eligible as per Panjab University Rules.
- b. The claimant candidate will have to submit a validated Transgender Certificate from the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment or Certificate of Identity as well as Identity Card issued by the District Magistrate as per the prescribed format given under 'The Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Rules, 2020 read with the Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Act, 2019. As per Circular No. Misc./A-1/1327-1627 dated 20.02.2024. (Already circulated by the Colleges Branch).

- L) **Blind students:** The free education to the completely blind student belonging to below poverty line, as described by the relevant Government notification/s, in any course in the University and its affiliated Colleges, subject to the students being otherwise eligible and on merit, but the candidate has to submit an affidavit to this effect issued by the competent authority. Even the free hostel accommodation may also be considered, if required by the students, but he/she will have to pay the mess charges, which are already subsidised. A limited number of course books (one per paper) may also be considered which would be returnable after the completion of the course. (Syndicate Para-I dated 18.04.2009)

M) **Weightage & Reservation for excellence in Youth Festival**

- a. One additional seat per unit will be reserved for those candidates who have excelled and outperformed in the Youth Festivals.
- b. The candidates availing the aforesaid weightage must fulfil the eligibility condition for admission to the particular course.
- c. Admission criterion will be fixed on the basis of merit as mentioned below and upon the verification of the original certificates of those candidates, who:
 - i. have presented an item in an international cultural festival approved by Punjab Govt./Govt. of India/Panjab University.
 - ii. have got distinction in All India National Inter University Youth Festival organised by AIU/ Govt. of India.
 - iii. have got distinction in North Zone Inter University Youth Festival organised by AIU.
 - iv. have secured First/Second/Third position in the Inter University Youth Festival organised by Govt. of Punjab/ any State or Central University.
 - v. have secured First/Second/Third position in Panjab University Inter Zonal Festival.
 - vi. have secured First/Second/Third position in Panjab University Zonal Festival.
 - vii. have secured First/Second/Third position in state level competition of State School Education Board of Punjab/ Haryana/HP/or CBSE/ICSE or any other recognised board.
 - Category A is considered as a higher category followed by B, C....onwards.
 - Preference will be given to the candidate/s who have represented Panjab University, Chandigarh in A, B, C or D category.

Rules and Regulations Governing Admissions

- In case of two or more candidates having equal position at equal level: Position secured in an individual item shall be rated higher than position secured as a team member. The eligibility of the candidate for participation in University Youth Festivals, in future, may also be considered. Academic record will be considered in case of tie between two or more candidates.

- d. In case of any ambiguity, the related certificates shall be verified from the Department of Youth Welfare, Panjab University through the concerned Chairperson/Principal/Head etc.
- e. The candidate/s admitted shall have to participate in the activities associated with his/her item. The admission committee will assess the participation of the candidate and in case the candidate does not fulfil the requirements, his admission may be cancelled. However, exemption may be given because of special reasons like sickness or any other unavoidable reason.

N) Weightage for Participation in Extra Curricular Activities

As per letter no 494 I I-4960I dated Jun 25, 2014 from the Deputy Registrar PU Chd:

- a. **National Cadet Corps (NCC):** The holders of NCC Certificates A, B and C shall be given the weightage in marks in the following manner – Certificate A: 1%, Certificate B: 2%, Certificate C: 3%
- b. **National Service Scheme (NSS):** As per syndicate para 13 (22.1.2014) and 36 (25.01.2015), NSS Volunteers will be given weightage in marks as follows- Certificate A: 1%, Certificate B: 2%, Certificate C: 3%
- c. **Zonal/ Inter-Zonal / Inter-University Youth Festival:**

Note: A candidate can claim weightage in one or more categories (i-iv) given above. The total weightage should not exceed 9% of the normalised marks obtained in qualifying examination.

These weightages shall not be used for determining eligibility for admission as prescribed by the University under its regulation.

Note: Additional seats may also be created, if needed, for ICCR scholars on Government of India Scholarships.

Semester Promotion Rules and Reappear Regulations

1. A candidate who is admitted to the 1st/3rd/5th semester of UG Classes will be allowed to be promoted to 2nd/4th/6th semester respectively. However, for promotion from 2nd to 3rd or from 4th to 5th semester the candidate will have to clear 50% of the total credits till that semester. It is further clarified that for calculating 50%, fractions like 2.5, 3.5 or 4.5 will be considered 3, 4 or 5 respectively.
2. A candidate shall be considered to pass in exam if he/she obtains 35% marks in each paper.

Rules and Regulations Governing Admissions

3. Candidates have to obtain pass marks in each course of theory and practical separately for each semester.
 - a. If a student has failed to qualify at least 50% credits in a semester he/ she shall leave the course. However, the student can appear in the next exam as a late college student without attending the classes but the original internal assessment shall remain the same. After qualifying the semester, he/ she can resume studies.
 - b. If taking into account all the semesters together up to 6th semester, the number of papers in which a student has failed exceeds 50%, he/ she shall leave the course. However, he/she can appear in the semesters in which he/ she failed as a late college student without attending the classes but the original internal assessment shall be retained. The student can resume the study but must complete the course in 6 years.
 - c. 6th semester results shall be notified only after the student has cleared all the papers. For other purposes, the marks will be made available provisionally.
4. A candidate who fails in any semester & is not covered under the Re-appear Regulation may be given one more chance to appear at the next exam without attending a fresh course of lectures but will have to repeat the entire exams. If a candidate fails to pass any semester exam even after repeating the entire exam, he/ she will be required to leave the course.
5. The Syndicate may extend this period, for a member of the regular armed forces, who is unable to complete the course owing to defence exigencies.
6. A candidate who appears in the reappear subject at the odd with odd, even with even exam under this Regulation shall have to bear exam fee as per University rules and will not be eligible for scholarship.
7. A candidate, who has passed second semester or any subsequent semester exam, discontinues his studies, may be permitted to join the next semester within 2 years of his passing the qualifying semester exam. If a candidate has completed the 1st semester in a college and cannot get admission in the 2nd semester due to some reason, he/ she should be given admission in the 2nd semester next year with the condition that he/ she must have attended the classes and appeared in examination in the college for the 1st semester. A few admission dates may also be allotted in January, i.e., one week after the winter break as per PU Academic Calendar, 2016-17. (As per Syndicate Para 49 Dated 01-05-2016).
8. The candidates shall be admitted strictly in accordance with the rules and regulations contained in the latest Panjab University calendar/guidelines/any other instructions which have been issued/may be issued by the University from time to time for the respective courses/examinations and in order of merit.
9. Admission of students to the institution is provisional and subject to the approval of Panjab University. The institution cannot be held responsible in case the University does not approve the admission of a student on account of giving incomplete information, concealing necessary facts or false information, attaching incomplete testimonials or choosing wrong combination of subjects or delayed submission of certificates etc. The fine/penalty imposed by Panjab University for any default in this regard shall be the personal responsibility of the student. Claims for refund of fees for cancellation of admission or penalty on this account will not be entertained.
10. Any instructions or rules received from the Director Higher Education, Chandigarh Administration/Panjab University, after the publication of this prospectus, will be binding on the students.
11. Students disqualified by any University/Board not recognised by PU, Chd shall not be admitted.
12. Environment, Road Safety Education and Violence against Women & Children and Drug is a compulsory paper, which the candidates are required to pass with at least 33% marks either in the 1st/ 2nd/ 3rd Year of the Course, failing which the Degree will not be issued.

Code of Conduct for Students

1. Students are expected to maintain the highest standards of discipline and exhibit dignified behaviour.
2. They shall abide by the rules and regulations of the College and uphold the discipline and esteem of the College.
3. Students must attend their classes regularly and carry their ID cards along.
4. Students must read the Notice Board and check the College Website regularly.
5. Keep the campus clean and plastic free.
6. Fans, lights and other electrical equipment must be switched off while leaving the labs and classrooms.
7. Consumption of intoxicants in any form is strictly prohibited in the College and Hostel premises.
8. Students are expected to carefully handle the College property. Sticking posters and advertisements or scribbling on walls and furniture is strictly prohibited.
9. Students are not allowed to invite outsiders to the College campus or Hostel premises, except their parents or authorised guardians.
10. Use of mobile phones should be avoided.
11. Students are expected to make optimal use of the Library and other academic, co-curricular facilities of the College in their free time.
13. Students must be appropriately dressed and adhere to the cultural values and ethos of the College.
14. Ragging, bullying, physical/verbal/sexual abuse or misbehaviour with fellow students or College staff is strictly prohibited and will be treated as criminal offence.
15. Students who do not follow the code of conduct are liable to be penalised/suspended/ expelled from the College as per the decision of the authorities.

Decision of the Principal shall be final and binding

Mid Semester Examinations Rules

1. College will conduct one mandatory Mid Semester Test in each semester.
2. The Internal Assessment of students will be based on these Mid Semester Tests as per PU guidelines.
3. Absence from these examinations on any ground will be treated as failure with nil marks.
4. Students absenting themselves from the Mid Semester Tests without leave will be fined as per rules.
5. Use of Mobile Phones is banned during exams and a fine of Rs 500/- will be imposed, if found guilty.

PU Examination Rules

Eligibility to appear in University Exams

1. The students are required to attend 75% of lectures and practicals (if applicable) held for the class in each subject offered (to be counted from last date of admission till the start of preparatory holidays.)
2. A student has to obtain 25% marks in the aggregate of all subjects in the Mid Semester Tests.
3. A student has to obtain minimum marks as per PU Chandigarh rules in discretionary test, if held.
4. The onus of timely submission of University Examination Form along with the required examination fee with the college office shall be on the student.

College Leave Rules

1. Students should apply for leave on the prescribed form. Leave approval up to 10 days by the Principal.
2. Names of students remaining absent for 06 consecutive days, without prior permission will be struck off from the College. Rs 1500/- shall be charged for re-admission.




